Welcome to the August edition of LINK



August is here and perhaps for many of us it is a time to get away and enjoy a break. If you have travel plans, I do hope you make the most of them and experience real refreshment. It's been a busy season for me and I'm certainly looking forward to some much-needed R'n'R.

Of course, one of the things Jesus promised his disciples is that He himself would be their rest when He declared himself to be the "*Lord of the Sabbath*" (Matt 12:8). Some Christians have taken that to mean that the cycle of six days of work followed by one day of rest, laid down in the Old Testament, is no longer useful to us today.

But I don't think Jesus was denying the benefit of regular rhythms of rest and recreation. Certainly in the 'always connected' lives we now live, the need to disconnect, switch off and retreat has never been more urgent.

Jesus' point was more that when we treat Sabbath rest as a rule, it actually undercuts the refreshment it should offer. We run out of milk on a Sunday morning and we're stuck, because we can't go shopping for 24hrs - it makes us *more* weary, and possibly bitter, too.

The positive point Jesus is making is that the most real rest we can experience is in the presence of Jesus, who blesses, provides and forgives. The Sabbath was originally a day when you don't work to provide for yourself, and simply let God provide what you need.

So if you're travelling this month, make sure you pack your Bible, and perhaps a prayer journal too, but whatever you're up to, may you know the restful presence of Jesus with you through the summer season.

Goodbye, and thank you, to Fiona Adams ...

Phil welcomed Fiona to the service on 9th July for us to say farewell, and thank her for all she has done for the school. He has enjoyed working alongside the school, and seeing the Christian ethos at work through 'Team Hordle'.

As Head for 16 years, Fiona has valued the physical and emotional closeness of the church, telling the children that Hordle Church is their church, and people pray for them every day. She is so grateful for all the support that her staff and children have received from the church community.

Phil asked Fiona for any special memories of her time at Hordle. A difficult question, but she recalled memories of Easter, with Morris the donkey parading around the daily mile track, followed by the children carrying their palm crosses and class crosses, walking past the beautiful floral cross and into church for their service. It was a special moment she will take with her.

Fiona finds it hard to imagine not being part of the school, and her new role is starting to feel very real. She has been appointed Assistant Primary Director for a large Academy Trust. She will be going into schools across the South, from London to Portsmouth, meeting school leaders, and helping them to do the best they can for their children. Phil said whilst it was sad to lose Fiona, her outstanding and inspirational leadership skills will help equip other senior leaders in their roles to achieve excellence.

Gill said it had been a privilege to play a small part in the life of the school, both as a Governor, and having the opportunity to welcome hundreds of children into the church - to give them candles when joining, Bibles when leaving and to many services throughout the school year.



Gill then led prayers for Fiona in her new challenge, for Lou Trim in her role as Head, and for the whole staff team. She was joined by children from the congregation, who read, and then gave to Fiona, the prayers they had written for her.

The next Bishop of Winchester will be the Right Reverend Philip Mounstephen, currently Bishop of Truro.



Bishop Philip will serve as the 98th Bishop of the Winchester Diocese. He will be welcomed at a service of installation in Winchester Cathedral later this year.

The appointment marks a return to the diocese for Bishop Philip who was born in Hampshire and who studied English Literature at the University of Southampton, where he came to Christian faith.

He says ‘being appointed as Bishop of Winchester has a very real sense of coming home to the place my faith was born and nurtured. My prayer is that as I rejoin the diocesan family that God will lead us together on a new adventure in serving his purposes, growing loving community, and building His Kingdom here in the Diocese of Winchester.’

Following a short career in teaching, Bishop Philip was ordained in the diocese of Oxford in 1988, where he also served his curacy. From 1992 to 1998, he was the vicar of St James Church, West Streatham in the Diocese of Southwark. He has also held posts as Deputy General Director at the Church Pastoral Aid Society (CPAS), chaplain of St Michael’s Church, Paris, ministering in English and French and supporting the church’s Tamil refugee congregation, and CEO of the Church Mission Society (CMS). He has been the diocesan Bishop of Truro since 2018.

He says, “It’s been a great privilege to serve the Diocese of Truro, where my family roots are, but I’m delighted to have been invited now to serve as Bishop of Winchester, a place which has very great personal significance for me. I look forward to leading us all on in loving service of our God and of his world.”

Philip is married to Ruth, a strategic planner who has worked in the NHS, local government and charity sector, and they have a married daughter, Kitty. Philip and Ruth enjoy showing hospitality at home, travelling in France and further afield, and walking Noggin the Dog. Philip can also often be found searching through the racks in second-hand record shops, a habit he acquired while a student in Southampton.

David Price 1927 - 2023

It is with sadness we hear that Rev. David Price has died. We send our sincere condolences to Barbara and all the family.

David was born in the Midlands in 1927. He worked for an Engineering Company, married Eileen and had two sons, Stephen and Nicholas. Following the sad death of Eileen, David's faith did not falter. He met and married Barbara in 1959.

David was called to the ministry at the age of 34 and he left for Oxford to study. He then served in the dioceses of Lichfield and Oxfordshire.

In 1975, David became Israel Director of the CMJ. He then moved to Jerusalem where he was rector of Christ Church in the Old City. In 1984, David and Barbara returned to London and served at St. Luke's, Earls Court.

In 1992, David came to Tiptoe - how fortunate we were to have such an inspirational preacher! David's boundless enthusiasm, faithful prayerfulness and dedication encouraged us all. David soon embarked on his plan to build a new church hall. We all prayed hard and soon a builder was free and willing; funds materialised, and the hall was up and running.

In 1997, David and Barbara retired to Malvern Hills - David loved to walk. Then, ten years later they moved to Ledbury. In 2014 David suffered a heart attack and needed valve-replacement surgery. This did give him time to reflect and he wrote a cycle of six books.

David dedicated his life to following the Lord. Now, he has taken up his rightful place in the Heavenly Realms. Those of us who knew him may well regard the hall as his visible legacy, but fond memories and love in our hearts is the legacy that really counts.

"For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain." (Philippians 1.21)

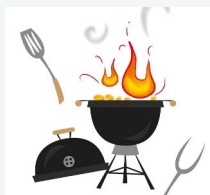

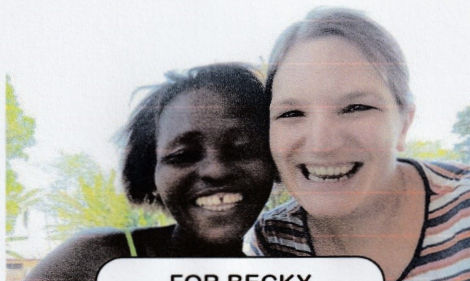
Our MAF partners Dave and Becky Waterman - back in Liberia after two months in the UK

Settling Back Into Life in Liberia



FOR DAVE

It seems common for us to hit the ground running wherever we go, and the return to Liberia was no different. I was able to take a few days before going back to work in the hangar to help set the new house up, which involved a busy few days of unpacking, sorting and DIY projects. It's coming together now, and it's such a great place to come home to every day. Though I know it's going to be a busy time with work once again, I am very glad to be back in Liberia, helping to facilitate the incredible work which MAF is doing in this part of the world.



FOR BECKY

There are so many emotions that hit you as you leave your home country, to live in your adoptive country once again. In Liberia it's often the heat and humidity that's the biggest impression. One thing that's really impacted me, however, is the truly warm welcome back we have received. I have had handshakes and hugs from the guards who keep us safe on the compound, the lovely ladies who come to sell produce at the door, and even a friend who works at the local supermarket. It's definitely helped in feeling as though we have arrived back home.



Let the Maintenance Begin!

It's not only house work keeping Dave busy, June is a month fully booked up with maintenance on all three of the West African fleet of Cessna Caravans. Because we are understaffed here with maintenance personnel, it is helpful to align the maintenance schedules, so that we can bring in a team of engineers to assist and get our planes back in the air as quickly, and as safely, as possible.

For this particular chunk of maintenance, we have help coming from Uganda, Australia and the Netherlands. There is a lot to get done, even with so many extra pairs of hands, with regular

inspections, defects to examine and correct, and even avionics installations in each of the three planes, providing the pilots with high quality equipment to aid them as they fly in the often complicated airspaces of Liberia and Guinea, particularly in the rainy season. A new transponder, weather radar and automatic engine monitor are ready to be put into place in the coming weeks.

As the physical work winds down toward the end of June, the pile of paperwork will continue. Part of the change in beginning to operate our planes on the American registration system, is a new piece of software to adjust to, and much historical data to copy from one system to another. It's easy to overlook all of these behind the scenes jobs that are very much a part of the life of maintenance, but they are just as essential as the physical labour, helping us to know when all of our planes require work to stay in tiptop shape.

We had an amazing time sharing about the work of MAF in West Africa in our time in the UK, and it was lovely to catch so many of our supporters there! If you didn't know, we're only able to serve in Liberia because of people partnering with us in prayer, but also financially. Colin Westlake

Colin died recently aged 91. He had endured indifferent health and a restricted life-style over recent years but died peacefully at home in Somerset to where he and Maureen had moved from Milford three years ago, to be with the family.

A member of Hordle Church for thirty years, Colin enjoyed an active and fruitful retirement while his wife Maureen was Head of Hordle School. His church life included being member of the PCC, leading the older children's groups and away days, and as a member of the hand-bell ringing team and music groups, playing the recorder. He was an active writer of articles for 'LINK' magazine.



I first knew him when we were fellow students at St. Paul's College, Cheltenham. He then became a career-long teacher of Primary school children who loved his wit, identification with them and his caring attitude. He had a charisma which I envied!

Colin became a headmaster firstly of a Hertfordshire school, where he also took a BEd degree - quite an achievement. He then became head of Highfield School in Southampton for ten years.

He identified strongly with Christian pilgrimage and firstly went with Bishop John Taylor's group to Winchester from Dorchester-on-Thames, and later from Winchester to Canterbury over eleven days. As well as long-distance walking with their son Tim, he completed two London marathons. He had remarkable physical stamina.

Colin was a firm Christian believer, a thoughtful and socially-minded teacher and, to me, a very long and good friend. He will be missed by many who knew him.

Thoughts from my garden ...

The recent rain has been welcome but the winds blowing at the moment are not pleasant. It worries me what will blow down, with the trees in full leaf. When the leaves are wet, they become heavier and more likely to damage. A branch has come off the plum tree, it did have many plums on it making it heavy, and the tree is old. For several years I have been thinking it is about to give up as other branches have come down. This year it has still a good number of plums and looks healthy, so I do not need to replace it just yet! It is a Victoria plum and to pick a ripe plum warm from the sun, and eat it, is bliss!



Other crops are maturing. The garlic is in the greenhouse drying out with the shallots. I am picking blueberries as they ripen and freezing them; the black currants I did share with the blackbirds but I have enough frozen. The birds did clear the gooseberry bushes and also my neighbours'. The sweet corn looks good and this rain is just what they need. I have put the purple sprouting out and the sprouts are growing well as long as I can keep the pigeons and the cabbage white butterflies away from them.

The robin comes in several times a day for porridge oats and will come and find us if there are none on the floor. I have bought some mealworms as they are supposed to like them, but so far he has not touched one!

Lord, teach me to pray.

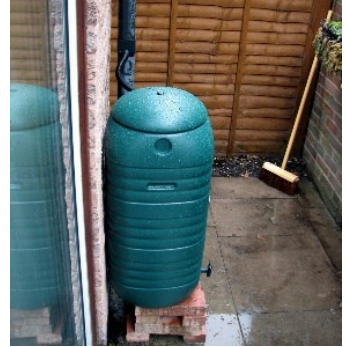

Q: Mary, Mary, quite contrary, how does your garden grow?

A: With a water butt, wildflower mix & vegetables all in row!

Here are tips shared by All Saints' Church members to help us to garden more sustainably:

1. Collect rainwater in a water butt
2. Never water the grass. It wastes water
3. "No Mow May" reduces fuel costs and provides pollen for insects



4. Leave part of the garden uncut for wildlife
5. Avoid chemicals and pesticides
6. Plant native species of trees and hedging
7. Cut hedges before, or after, the birds nest
8. Sow an area with wildflower mix

9. Grow your own vegetables and fruit organically

10. Compost vegetable peelings, garden waste and teabags

11. Feed the birds in the winter

12. Consider a wildlife pond

Life in all its fullness is deeply rooted in all aspects of Hordle. The concept of teamship is tangible with John 10:10 considered the glue that 'holds us'.

Robust governance ensures that the vision is seen and felt throughout practice as well as policy. The work of the foundation governors is especially striking.

The Christian vision inspires social action. *Life in all its fullness* is for everyone. The 'John 10:10 Fund' supports those in the local community who are in need. Relationships with a school in Rwanda mean the impact of the vision is extensive.

Behaviour is exemplary. Where conflict occurs, it is resolved quickly with authentic forgiveness and a peaceful manner. The community live very well together. There is a clear sense of watching over one another in love. The 'GrandHordles' scheme is striking in its impact for all.

Collective worship is an exceptional expression of the Christian vision. This is underpinned by the strong and lasting relationships that exist with the local church. Prayer is strikingly powerful. At the end of every worship there is an open invitation to respond. Pupils readily offer prayers in a remarkable manner that is utterly moving.

A postscript to the Hordle School SIAMS report

When the report was sent to parents, two letters accompanied it.

One was from Mrs Adams, in which she wrote: *'It is with an enormous sense of pride that I present to you our final SIAMS report. Whilst it is a church school inspection, it is actually, at its deepest level, an inspection of culture and ethos which should be broad based and inclusive for those of all faiths and none. For that reason, I am so pleased to see the word 'love' used 6 times in this report, something I know both myself and others tangibly feel in this building every single day.*

'I am also delighted to see the word 'remarkable' used 3 times, and, as I ready myself to step out of the doors for the final time in 4 days time, it is memories of a truly 'remarkable' school that I will take with me. Leading Team Hordle has been both a privilege and a joy.'

The second was from Rev Phil, on behalf of the Governing Body: *'This result marks a wonderful capping off of Mrs Adams' time as Headteacher at Hordle, and the governing body are truly grateful for the clear and positive leadership she has provided that has enabled the school to develop such a brilliant ethos.'*
