Although in demand globally, she increasingly restricts her movements within the UK so as not to add further damaging carbon emissions through flights to countries, unless this is quite unavoidable.

The Hope of the World in flesh and blood dwelling among us.



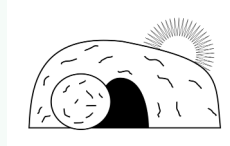
*Thirty three years later, this same man rode into Jerusalem,

This month Kate Pryde looks at
verse one of this psalm ...

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

The image of 'shepherd' is not so familiar to us these days, although programmes like Country File and This Farming Life may have made the image more vivid for us. No doubt we are also aware of four-wheel drives and sheepdogs rounding up the sheep.

The image of a shepherd was very familiar to David because it was when he was guarding his father Jesse's sheep that he was anointed by Samuel to be the King who would replace Saul. It's an image also found in Psalm 78 v.52

'Then he led out his people like sheep and guided them in the wilderness like a flock.'

So this picture is a familiar one to the Jewish people of the time and would have been equally so to Jesus from his knowledge of the Old Testament.

But this image is not always wholesome. In Ezekiel 34 there is a long prophecy against the leaders (the shepherds) of Israel. There those leaders are likened to shepherds who care nothing for those in their charge but have fed themselves and ignored the needs of the people (sheep). Not an unfamiliar image for us today!

However, in our Saviour Jesus we have a **good** shepherd '*who lays down his life for the sheep*' (John 10 v.11). He is a shepherd who calls us by name and through whom we are saved, and who seeks out the one who is lost. He is a shepherd who feeds his flock, who guides them and through whom we will not lack for knowledge of God and guidance in our daily living.

News from the bell tower ...

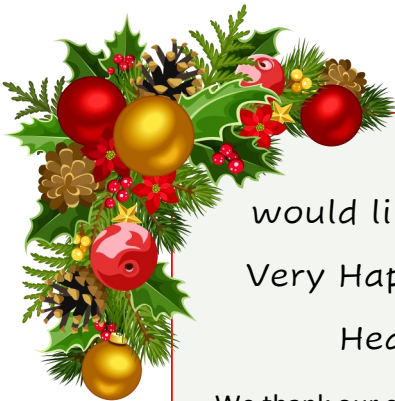
What a year!

Trauma is a **Wound to the Heart** as described by Bible Society when introducing the recently launched Navigating Trauma resource. Susan Wingrave, Bible Society's Volunteer Development Officer and Course Facilitator explained this resource to me recently.

Bible Society recognises that trauma can be triggered by many differing events. It is not always understood or recognised by those experiencing it or those providing support. Any event involving loss including bereavement, job loss, loss of ability, loss of home are just some of the trigger incidents in a life.

Bible Society provides residential training courses for those wishing to be a facilitator in their home community. There are six core sessions with additional sessions for events such as domestic abuse. Bible Society views Navigating Trauma as Domestic Mission in helping Mission Partners to engage with trauma sufferers. The course can then be delivered in a House Group setting.

For more information on this subject, visit the Bible Society website and listen to Naomi Dunn, International Advocacy Support Officer, explain the working concept.

Bible Society teams in the Middle East are bringing the Bible to life, in a very special way, for refugees fleeing war. Alongside food and other essentials, we're offering Bible-based trauma healing to refugees, helping people of all ages to talk through their experience with trained facilitators. Through this programme, thousands of refugees are experiencing the Bible in a new way.

Shoebboxes

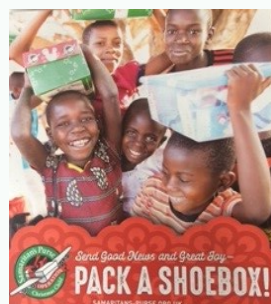
The shoeboxes which were returned have been exceptionally full with gifts which will thrill any child receiving them, so a huge thank you to those who have been so generous.

**At Christmas 2022, David Moynagh used this story in a sermon.
It surely bears repeating ...**

During the Gold rush in the west of America in the 1800s, many men went gold digging in the hope of making their fortune. In one area a few of these men banded together, deciding that working together was likely to be more profitable. They claimed a small valley which was likely to yield gold.

One day a young Indian girl turned up. As there were no other women in the camp this was a problem as the girl was pregnant but the men did not have the heart to throw her out. She went into labour the next day. One of the men knew a little first aid so acted as midwife. A beautiful baby was born but sadly the mother died.

The men now had a dilemma - what to do with the baby? After much discussion they decided to keep the baby. Soon after that they hit a rich gold seam which they attributed to the new member of their group, so they called the baby Lucky.

One day, Lucky went to grab the finger of the man looking after him and put it in his mouth. The man was so appalled how dirty his hands were that he went straight down to the shop and bought some soap with which to wash. Soon the shop ran out of soap as all the men realised the importance of cleanliness around Lucky. They came to see that their clothes were filthy and not suitable to hold a child against and it was not long before the shop ran out of washing powder.

One of the men made a rough box crib for Lucky to sleep in but they realised how crude and bare it was so they sent off to the nearest town for a new modern cot. It looked wonderful but it made the room in which Lucky slept appear so unkept that the men redecorated Lucky's room. It didn't stop there! Soon the whole house was spick and span. As time went on Lucky accompanied the men to the mine and he would be left outside. This area was pretty awful, so they tided it up and made a little garden.

Sadly the area was hit by terrible storms and a flash flood coursed through the valley destroying just about everything. Lucky and most of the men were killed, but the story of how a baby changed tough mining men lived on and made folklore in that particular area.

This may be a true story or a simple fable but, at this time of year, we also tell the story of a baby called Jesus who too was born in pretty awful surroundings and laid to sleep in an animal manger. A baby who has also changed the lives of many men and women over the last 2000 years, but the difference is that we know this story to be true.
