Welcome to the March edition of LINK



Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's journey. And he called out, "Yet forty days, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!" (Jonah 3:4)

Of all the seasons in the Christian calendar to have had its theological significance stripped away by secularism, it may be surprising that Lent was among the first. We still expect to see wise men and stables appear on greetings cards at Christmas, and we know it is rare to see many

empty tombs or crosses popping up outside churches at Easter. But even in my childhood the meaning of Lent was nothing more than giving up chocolate with a vague sense that this was to instill some moral fibre.

Yet the 40 days from Ash Wednesday through to Palm Sunday at the start of April were fixed in place by the ancient church for a specific reason. Numbers matter in the Bible, and the 40 days of Lent match the 40 days or years that God sometimes gave people to repent of their waywardness and turn back to Him. Much more than our New Year's resolutions, Lent is a time for Christians to look back and reflect whether our lives have been characterized by faithful obedience to God's word in recent months and, inevitably, to recognize once again that we stand confident in God's presence only because of Christ's atoning work on the cross which we are preparing to celebrate at Easter.

The thought that God would require us to consider our failures is counter cultural in a society that tells us to love ourselves and build our self worth. But at no point in the Bible does God test people or call them to account, except to help them out of a direction that will lead to disaster. Indeed the scandal of these accounts is that as soon as anyone believed God's warnings, he rescued them and forgave them, no matter how far they had got things wrong.

As we face some serious times of testing in our wider world right now, perhaps this Lent is an apt time for us all to reflect seriously whether we can recognize our need for the kind of divine help and salvation that only the Good Friday Cross provides, but which is available to anyone ready to receive it.

Home Groups

Most Churches around the country run Home Groups, where church family members gather to study the Bible.



For our Church, Home Groups meet together midweek in someone's home to study the Bible, pray and share fellowship. Meetings usually take place fortnightly. Some groups have a meal beforehand.

Most groups follow a range of study methods – either a published course of Bible studies, reading and discussing a Christian book, exploring themes from the Sunday sermon or independently studying a book of the Bible.

During the Lent period, Phil, our Vicar, suggested that all the groups follow the same course, called Discipleship Explored. Phil is also running the course on Monday mornings from 11.00 - 12.00 for those members of the congregation who do not attend a Home Group, and for those Home Groups who wish to study with a larger group of people. I hope you have been taking part in these studies.

It would be lovely to have more groups. If you have led a group before and would like to start a new group, or are currently an existing member and would like to 'breakaway' and start a new group, I would love to hear from you. I know there are people looking to join groups. We just need the leaders.

One group does meet via Zoom, so there would be the opportunity to join them, until a new group is established.

However we meet, the aim is the same – to deepen our relationship with God and each other, to grow in love and knowledge of God and to learn how best to support one another in the Church.

Men's Breakfast 11th February

The Reverend Cliff McClelland, chaplain at Winchester prison, spoke to us about his work with Winchester staff and inmates. Cliff spoke of the ripple



effect of anger, remorse and regret that affects many prisoners. Sadly over 50% of offenders have a parent who have been in prison, which makes it difficult to break the tradition. Many prisoners suffer from PTSD.

Cliff drew our attention to our own sinfulness and how we fall short of God's purpose. He reminded us of the passage in Exodus 20:13 – 'Thou shalt not murder' - reminding us that by turning our backs on sin we turn towards God through Christ our Saviour. We were reminded of how Moses, David and Paul had all been guilty of murder, but were used powerfully by God. Cliff also drew our attention to the message of restoration that we find in Matthew 5.

The prison chaplaincy team seek to encourage restorative justice, where both offender and victim are encouraged to communicate with each other. He spoke about the example of 'A', who was raised a Buddhist, attended a Christian School, and later, as an adult, committed a serious crime as a result of an alcohol problem. He was supported by the chaplaincy team, giving his life to Jesus and finding peace. He spoke of finding 'D', a broken man at the foot of the chapel cross one day, convicted of his brokenness before Jesus, again able to find the love and acceptance of Jesus.

Cliff went on to encourage churches to consider joining the crucial Welcome Directory, helping Faith Communities welcome people leaving prison.

Rwanda, and supported many Last year brought a request to help

towards completion of the church at Gisanze, which has a growing congregation of extremely poor families, widows, and orphans some with HIV, who originally worshipped in a very small chapel building because financially they were not able to build a new one. Finance is still the problem.

The Government closed all churches which did not fit with the demands of new legalisation including Gisanze. Their requirements are cleanliness, with good and big glazed metal windows and doors, hand washing facilities and a

minimum of 4 toilets. In order to meet present and future needs, the



parish set about building a new church, both for worship and other church /community activities such as a nursery school and skill teaching.

This traditional building material of clay bricks in sub-Saharan Africa is is used breause it is cooler, cheaper, and requires less energy to make. Pastor Vincent Habimana sent an estimate of

"costings" to complete the build to meet the Government standards. The total amounts came to about £4000, and last Lent we were able to send to the diocese for Gisanze £1223 for which they expressed grateful thanks and praise, and this Lent, the objective is to continue to fund further progress, and so aid the congregation in Gisanze to forward the work of caring and proclaiming the Kingdom of our Saviour.

We have an apprentice in post, and also offer volunteering, training, and work experience opportunities on our Step up for Work programme.

Please help us to get our initial production up to speed. We need items such as a new mower and tools, along with seeds, compost and also funds for maintenance



of the machinery and equipment. In all, we are looking to raise £2,000. We would be most grateful if your Church could help us reach this target. Your generosity would be helping people like Emily, who told me "I enjoy growing vegetables and also flowers, I like to see the butterflies and bees on the flowers"

Josh, Production Chef Apprentice, makes the jams and chutneys. He told me "I am really happy to be working in the Kitchens at Minstead Lodge; I have always wanted to be a chef and now I am learning how to do that. I like everything about making the jams and chutneys, except I am not that keen on the smell of the vinegar!"

PCC Jottings from the last 9 months

PCC training took place at the May meeting, especially for new members but a timely reminder for us all about our responsibilities as Trustees and how we should conduct ourselves.



The PCC met for a Vision Day in June to discuss whether the Vision statement in the Parish Profile made for Phil's appointment was still appropriate and how we move forward. The PCC are aware there is much to be done to fulfil this vision.

Finance- the Common Mission fund payment (that pays Phil's salary) has been decreased and we have been managing to pay our full share for the first time for many years. The finance committee has recommended moving some of our necessary reserves into an investment account to earn higher interest.

Fabric – both churches and halls have had a quinquennial inspection. There are jobs to be done but nothing too major. The tornado that hit St. Andrew's area caused damage to several trees and a few roof tiles.

The Eco church team have continued to encourage us to set an example in sustainable living. A 'warm space' has been set up in Hordle pavilion on Mondays which the church is supporting with personnel.

Liz Wyatt has taken over from Gill Morris as Parish Safeguarding Officer. New safeguarding policy for social media personnel has been approved.

The health and safety policy has been reviewed, updated and accepted.

We also receive reports from the subcommittees: mission, hall management, eco church and finance.

The position for a children's and youth worker was advertised. This produced enquiries but no suitable applications so the position has been readvertised.


The Parish profile has been updated and the role description is in process for an Associate Minister to assist Phil across the parish.

A STORY OF HOPE AND REGENERATION

ENGLISH PASTORAL By JAMES REBANKS

A touching autobiography of family life, hard work and passion for the natural world from a Lakeland farmer. He agonises over the pressure to produce cheap food and his shock to realise that soil is damaged by over dependence on chemical fertilisers.



There is challenge: "we should farm as if we are going to live for a thousand years. The idea is that we might protect our natural resources better if we had to face the long-term consequences for our actions instead of passing on a mess for someone else to sort out ... Are we big enough, brave enough, or wise enough to do anything so grand and idealistic as stop the damage we are doing?"

There is hope, poetry and beauty. James is raising his family surrounded by streams re-engineered to meander through restored wetlands, grazed by traditional cattle that tread more lightly on sensitive pasture, wildflower meadows, crop rotation and habitats that invite curlews and lapwings to return to breed.

I loved it.

'People were already extremely vulnerable, so this earthquake is a crisis on top of a crisis. It is yet another layer of devastation that adds to the poverty and vulnerability experienced by ordinary Syrians.'

'Tearfund does not work in Turkey, but we are committed in prayer to everyone affected by the earthquake.'
