A Modern Parable

The poppy is seen as the symbol of a charity that still cares for those damaged by war, as a way of remembering the sacrifice made by many who fought in war and as a sign of hope. It can also be seen as a 'vote for peace'.



Jesus often taught in parables. Here is a modern one ...

A rich man lived in the Middle East. He was so rich that he owned 17 camels. He had led a peaceful and prosperous life and so when he wrote his will it said one half of his riches should go to his son, one third to his grandchild and one ninth to his nephew.

Soon after this the rich man died. When it came to dividing up the camels according to the will, the three beneficiaries had a problem!

If half the camels were given to the son, he should get eight-and-a-half camels, which would mean killing a camel!

If a third of the camels were given to the grandson, that would mean again killing a camel so he could get five and two thirds!

There was no way the nephew could get his share unless another camel was killed.

The three of them quarrelled and threatened to go to war over the camels.

Nearby there lived a very poor man who only had one camel. He wanted to help. He wanted to be a peacemaker and stop war breaking out. He decided to offer his only camel into the rich man's inheritance to help resolve the problem. It was a huge sacrifice but the inheritance now consisted of 18 camels.

The three sat down and did the sums again.

Half of 18 would go to the son, so he took nine camels.

One third of 18 would go to the grandson so he took six camels.

One ninth of 18 would go to the nephew, so he took two camels.

After each had taken his share, to their surprise there was one camel left over! The poor man received his camel back!

He had made peace by his willingness to give up all he had.

The robin has started to come indoors again after several weeks. Of course, it depends if the weather is warm enough to leave the back door open! He does like porridge oats, the jumbo size ones. I could leave some outside the door I suppose but it might encourage undesirables!

Now is the season to have a good tidy up. I have been hedging, especially where the best blackberries grow. It is a bit prickly but I put the rubbish wrapped in plastic sheets and take it to Efford. Some goes into bags, but it is easier to empty if I just lift out the pile and shake it in to the bin. The brambles seem to have grown well this year - I did clear behind the greenhouse but it needs doing again.

St Andrew's "meadow"

Genesis 2 v 15: The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it.

With global decline in biodiversity and loss of habitat very much in the spotlight, what a delight to host the wildflower meadow at St Andrew's! Managing the churchyard for Nature is hard work, but exciting. Bob Lord, our local conservationist and advisor, has visited regularly to record the flora and fauna: **54 different types** of plant and insect: names we recognize, others more unusual, but each vital to support the butterflies and moths that have



found a home here. **Biodiversity** is an essential ingredient of a stable climate.

Mid-September, many hands made light of the work. They strimmed the meadow, tackled brambles and excess growth around its borders.

Wildflowers prefer poor soil, so the cuttings were raked off a few days after **The Big Strim** and moved to make new heaps at the edge of the meadow. Raking allows the last few seeds to fall and reseed themselves. Over the winter these heaps will provide **new habitats** for creepie-crawlies. Larvae laid underground are protected by cutting the grass a few inches higher than a typical garden mow.



Just imagine how much land will be managed for nature in the UK as more churches discover the delights of **offering refuge to wildlife** in their churchyards. At the same time, vital greenspace is made available to local communities where there is less opportunity for people to enjoy the **health benefits** of time in the natural world!

The COP27 Climate Summit runs from 6th – 18th November.

Let's use this CAFOD Prayer for everyone meeting there:

God of blessings, the universe sings of your glory.

Deepen our gratitude for all you have made and awaken in us a renewed commitment to care for the earth and for each other. Inspire world leaders at COP27 with openness to listen to those most affected by climate change and with courage to act urgently and wisely, so that our common home may be healed and restored and all people, and generations to come, may delight in it. Amen.

November's Eco Tip

Resist the powerful urge to tidy up! Leave an area of your garden naturally unkempt.

Hedgehogs and other small mammals use fallen leaves and dead vegetation to build their nests. Add a 12-15cm hole to the bottom of your fence or gate so hedgehogs can crawl through.



Some species of butterfly hibernate in ivy thickets or tree hollows. The majority of insects survive as eggs, larvae or pupae in cracks and crevices in the garden.

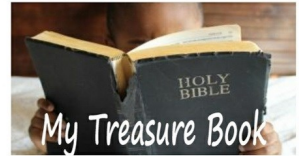

Thanks to God's goodness and the prayers of many, Dave recovered well enough from major surgery in June for both he and Becky to travel to Ohio, where Dave studied hard for two weeks before sitting exams to gain his American Maintenance Licence – awarded with flying colours! He is now equipped to sign out the American registered MAF plane flying in neighbouring Guinea and those that will soon be flying in Liberia. (Dave, well done from Hordle and Tiptoe Parish!)



A delight for them both whilst in Ohio was eating fresh strawberries at \$1.69, a pleasure denied them in Liberia with the cost \$13.59!

From Ohio, Dave and Becky flew to the MAF US base in Idaho and spent a wonderful week with colleagues and viewing close-up a new plane heading to Liberia later this year.

Before leaving for America, the fitness of Dave's stomach muscles was tested as he installed a new autopilot system into a MAF plane, the first installation of all MAF's international fleet. Challenging work, but successful!



Becky, too, has been hard at work in the hangar, stock taking and transferring the contents of a shipping container onto new shelving – counting and relabelling tiny little parts and making sure everything ended up in its right place and, therefore, easy to find in the future. 'A tiring but very necessary job!'

Dave and Becky continue to be amazed by the stories of their little planes reaching isolated places with medical supplies, equipment for schools, teacher trainers, Bible translators, trainers of pastors – the list goes on and on.

Let's continue to pray for Dave and Becky as they serve with MAF in its mission to bring hope in the Name of Jesus to isolated people.

November is often a dull and dreary month - Autumn is over and Christmas is still weeks away. In our two churches, All Souls Day is November 1st and St Andrew's Day is 30th, with Remembrance Day, November 11th, reminding us of the huge price paid for the freedom we have. In some years the New Forest is at its best in November, with the colours of the leaves and the sunshine on the bracken. But the pannage, letting the pigs out into the woods, has been earlier this year.

As we near the end of 2022, there are so many problems in the world - political, economic, famine, droughts, war in Ukraine, floods and Covid - all of which could make us despair.

Possibly a new King, Charles III, and a Coronation to come, might give us something else to think about.

So, as Christians, where do we turn to? We need to take stock of our faith and trust in the Lord Jesus Christ. With the ending of the church's year, and Advent approaching, we can look forward to celebrating Christ's First Coming at Christmas and be reminded of his Second Coming in Glory.

As Hebrews 12 1-2 reminds us, *'Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders us, and the sin which so easily entangles us, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Street Pastors are Christian men and women who engage with people on the streets offering reassurance, safety and support through listening, helping and caring. We work together with other partners in the night-time economy, schools and communities to make our city safer.

Each city project is set up by Ascension Trust, which is the governing body behind Street Pastors, and run locally with support from local churches and community groups, in partnership with the police, local council, schools and other statutory agencies.

Southampton Street Pastors is a charitable company (Comp. No. 7292166 & Charity No. 1137759) that has around 135 Christian volunteers drawn from

over 50 churches in and around Southampton. In Southampton we have been operating since 2009.



On our community Street Pastor patrol, the team were presented an award for the work they do. Despite the inscription reading '2nd Runner Up Place - Eastleigh Darts Team', the presenter 'Dave' guaranteed it was definitely for us....no questions asked.

We operate under licence from Ascension Trust and are part of a countrywide (and international) network operating in nearly 300 towns and cities in the UK and abroad.

A Street Pastor's life is varied and the good people of Southampton like to show their gratitude....

What Street Pastors Do

We undertake around 45 hours of training over three weekends (Friday evenings and all day Saturday and Sunday), regardless of which type of Street Pastoring you wish to do. To become a Street Pastor an applicant must have been a committed Christian for at least a year, be a member of a local church, be able to provide a positive reference from his/her minister, a character reference, be at least age 18 (with no upper limit!), undergo a DBS (formerly CRB) check and the training course and be prepared, if able, to make a contribution to cover the cost of his/her uniform and training (although we encourage the Street Pastor's fellowship to be involved in this - we will never turn down a suitable candidate over funding issues).

Once the training has been completed a Street Pastor can commence patrolling. They usually commit to at least one monthly patrol in the night-time/community or if they favour Afternoon Community Patrols, then once a week during term-time.

What is it really like to be a Prayer Pastor at Southampton Street Pastors?

Prayer Pastors remain at base (our office building on the night time) and receive phone calls from Street Pastors on the streets about the people they encounter, and the circumstances, to request prayer. The prayer team pray and, as soon as the street pastor team can, they will ring the prayer team again to give updates.

How to become a Prayer Pastor

To become a Prayer Pastor, the criteria are very similar to those for becoming a Street Pastor. Once the initial training has been completed a Prayer Pastor usually commits to at least one monthly patrols in the night-time/community or if they favour the work of the Afternoon Community Pastors, then once a week.
