A recent Diocesan communication contained a letter from the Bishop of Winchester Designate. This is an abbreviated version of it.



DIOCESE of
WINCHESTER

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This week Winchester Cathedral witnessed an historic – if rather bizarre – event. On Tuesday evening I was elected as Bishop of Winchester by the College of Canons (and I'm very grateful to them for having done so!) It's one crucial step, although not the final one, in my formally becoming your Bishop.

It was, by any stretch of the imagination, however, an unusual election. There was only one candidate, and the Canons were instructed to elect me by the King, no less, via documents called a 'Congé d'élire' and a 'Letter Missive'. They had no choice in the matter. So what then was it all about? And is it all too obscure to be of any relevance to us?

It does, in fact, express something very important. And that is the ancient principle that the Diocese itself has a critical role to play in the process of discerning and calling its Bishop.

The Diocese of Winchester has been fully involved in the whole process from the start: through the work of the Vacancy in See Committee; through the drawing up of the Statement of Needs; and through the Diocese's significant involvement in the Crown Nominations Commission, which led ultimately to the invitation to me to be nominated as the next Bishop of Winchester. The College of Canons' election of me is representative of all that.

There is, though, another, more theological sense of the word 'election' that relates to our God's choosing and calling of us. And that sense too is absolutely vital in all of this. It's vital to me to know that this is God's calling on me for the next stage of my life and ministry (and frankly I wouldn't go anywhere near it if I didn't believe that!).

Both those senses of calling are vital: called by the people of God, and called by God himself. And very often of course that latter calling is discerned through the first.

I hope and pray in this next season of our Diocese's life we all grow in confidence in that calling, and in turn have the joy of seeing others too discern God's calling to know him, to love him, to serve him and to follow him.

The booked speaker had unfortunately had to cancel, so we were given a choice ... just breakfast, or breakfast followed by a talk from David Moynagh about ***Tools for Self Reliance***. A vote was held and we unanimously chose a talk.

David gave us a very informative, illustrated talk about 'Tools'. This charity is based at Netley Marsh where they refurbish donated tools and sewing machines. These are then sorted and are sent out to about five locations across Africa in 20-foot containers, with two or three of these going every year.

The contents of the containers enable locally run workshops to help village communities to earn a living. Although not claiming to be Christian based, 'Tools' is fulfilling a very useful role in enabling deprived folk to get a foot on the work/business ladder.

Christmas Shoeboxes

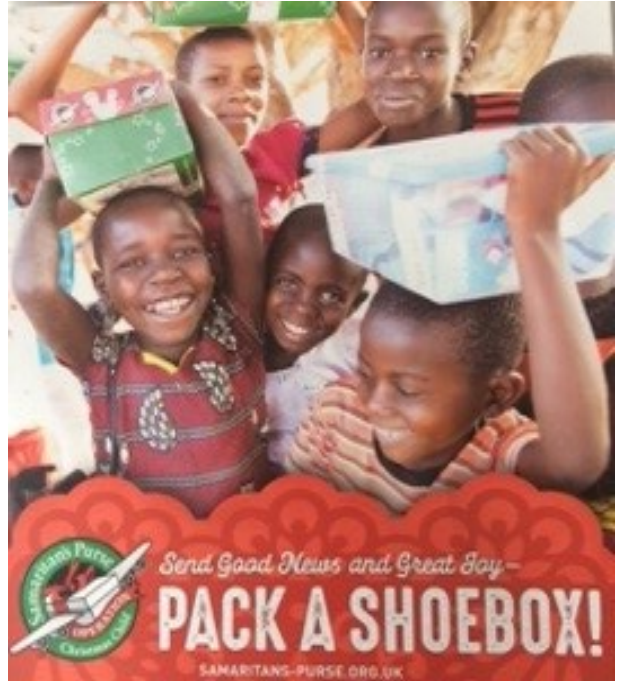
It is hard for us to imagine the plight of children in Libya, Morocco, Turkey, Syria and Ukraine - families who have lost everything.

In recent weeks, changes have been made to the provision for children in church at All Saints'. Phil's letter explaining these changes is summarised here.



As we begin a new school year, the Sunday School leaders have reviewed our provision for children at the 10:30 service at All Saints'.

We have decided that the best way we can provide for our children is to invite the secondary school children to stay in the main service each Sunday,

where we will provide them with a worksheet they can use to help them engage with the sermon, whilst the younger children continue to go out to their respective primary and preschool aged groups.

The heartbeat of a church service is hearing what God has to say to us, so we'll be making these sheets available to the whole congregation to help us to engage with what is being said and note key insights and reflections to take home. I hope that many people in the congregation, young and old, will find them helpful. We will be making a new commitment to structuring our services consistently and keeping to time, whilst paying careful attention as leaders and preachers to speaking to all ages present each week.

Our existing groups will continue as before, with parents accompanying their preschool children into the church room, and primary aged children going with their leaders into the hall. Rooted returns for school years 5-6 this term.

I express my deep gratitude to all the team members who have been faithfully providing these various groups. Do join me in praying that God would keep providing us with all we need to serve one another, especially as our new Children's and Youth Worker joins us in the spring.

Everyone can have their own conversations with me. I'm never too busy. I hope they will.

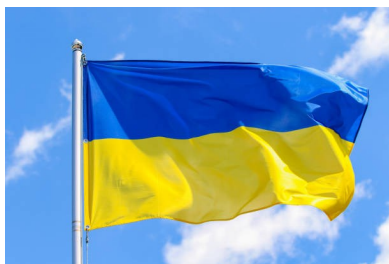

Bible Society reports:***

The war in Ukraine has led to a dramatic rise in the demand for Bibles as people ask existential questions about life and death. The Ukrainian Bible Society reports that, in the last 15 months, some 700,000 Bibles have been distributed across the war-torn country. This is a five-fold increase on numbers handed out before the war. In 2020, some 136,767 Bibles were distributed in Ukraine.

Anatoliy Raychynets, deputy general secretary of the Ukrainian Bible Society said, 'The experience of this time is that so many people are looking for Bibles and churches.

'We are doing everything possible to reach all the needs, but more Bibles are needed. With the help of the word of God, we can bring the love of God to those who need it.'

Bibles are distributed around the country, including to soldiers and civilian communities on the front line, and to those in hospital. 'Wherever the Bible is taken, it is very much appreciated,' said Anatoliy.

Anatoliy goes on to thank everyone for their truly inspiring support for his organisation in these challenging times.

Record number of Bibles distributed across Ukraine -

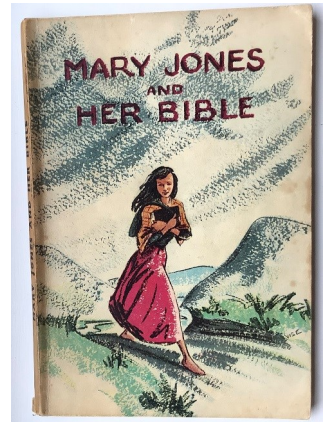


The Bible Society will be celebrating Bible Sunday on 29th October. Abbreviated from the Society's website, this is a brief history of its foundation.

The story of Bible Society and its founding revolves around three remarkable individuals: a determined Welsh girl, a visionary Welsh pastor, and a campaigning MP.

Mary Jones – the determined Welsh girl

In 1800, a 15-year-old Welsh girl named Mary Jones trekked 26 long miles through the rugged terrain of north Wales to buy a Welsh Bible. Mary was so determined to have a Bible of her own, in her own language, that she had saved up for six long years before her walk to Bala.

With the help of Revd Thomas Charles of Bala, who sold her three Bibles for the price of one, Mary Jones' determination was rewarded. Her story – and her unswerving desire to get hold of God's written word – soon became the talk of the churches in the area.

Revd Joseph Hughes – the visionary Welsh pastor

Inspired by Mary's story, and by the need for Bibles for Welsh speakers, Revd Joseph Hughes asked a daring question: 'If for Wales, why not for the kingdom? And if for the kingdom, why not for the world?'

That question, posed at a meeting of the Religious Tract Society on 7th December 1802, would reverberate across Wales and, ultimately, the world. It was the moment that set in motion the founding of our society.

William Wilberforce – the campaigning MP

Captured by the vision of God’s word being available for all people, William Wilberforce and other members of the Clapham Sect decided to act. They made this vision part of their campaign to ‘make goodness fashionable’ – in the hope of inspiring people to fall in love with the Bible.

On 7th March 1804, at a meeting of around 300 at the London Tavern in Bishopsgate, Wilberforce and the campaigning groups he was a part of formed the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Over 200 years and counting

Since that day over 200 years ago, the British and Foreign Bible Society has become Bible Society – a charity committed to offering the Bible to the world. There are now about 150 local Bible Societies around the world, which undertake the work in their locations.

Today, we stand on the shoulders of these giants of our past – Mary Jones, Revd Joseph Hughes, William Wilberforce and others – committed to making the Bible available for every man, woman and child in the world.’

Bible Sunday 2023

Bible Sunday is on 29th October this year – a day set aside in the church calendar to celebrate the gift of God’s word for the UK’s Bible Societies.

National Bible Sunday is an annual event held every fourth Sunday in January. The history of National Bible Sunday can be traced to the publication of the Anglican Book of Common Prayer in 1549.

(This is when our parish celebrates Bible Sunday.)

Church of England Schools *where it all began...*



The history of Church of England schools began, building on mid seventeenth century Puritan sponsored education, when the National Society for the Promotion of Education was founded in 1811. This established an education system open to all children with an ethos to be: "A community school with a distinctive Christian character". Today, approximately a quarter of all primary schools have a Church of England foundation through which they strive to provide the highest standard of education possible, in partnership with the State.

Hordle School is a Voluntary Aided (VA) Church School. Voluntary Aided and Voluntary Controlled schools came into being as a result of

the 1944 Education Act with approximately 40% of schools opting for a VA status. VA schools share financial costs with the LEA and the Government. As a result of this VA schools take on a number of additional responsibilities. These will include managing their own admission policy with the Diocese and the LEA. There is a requirement for VA schools to have a majority by two of Foundation Governors.

The Trust Deed for Hordle school dates back to 11th June 1859 when Mr and Mrs West of Newlands agreed to 'Grant and Convey' a parcel of land measuring 130 square perches to the vicar of Hordle, on which the School would be established. When the State took over

responsibility for Church Schools following 1944 the Education Act, Hordle trustees would have been elected to ask for the VA model to be applied to its context, hence retaining more influence and authority over the school but also taking on greater levels of responsibility, mainly in relation to the site and its buildings.

Planting seeds of hope amid crisis in Sri Lanka

Across the UK, churches and communities are getting together to celebrate Harvest. 8,000 miles away in Sri Lanka, people affected by leprosy are struggling to eat.

In Sri Lanka, many people live in poverty in rural communities. Making a living has never been easy. Over the last few years, economic crisis has made life even tougher.

Sivamalar lives in the northern tip of Sri Lanka. When she was diagnosed with leprosy over 10 years ago, everything changed.

Then, the economic crisis hit in 2020. Like so many families affected by leprosy, Sivamalar felt the impacts acutely. Providing for her family of eight became hard. “Supporting the family was a nightmare,” Sivamalar told us. “The days we could eat one decent meal were blessed days”.

Kaveri Kala Manram (KKM), our partners in Sri Lanka, are helping people affected by leprosy to get back on their feet. Deborah works with KKM, visiting families affected by leprosy. “We meet their basic needs, such as housing, water, and livelihood activities”, she told us. She also teaches people affected by leprosy self-care techniques so they can be independent, and ensures people get the mental health support they need. A vital part of their work is helping people like Sivamalar to start home gardens. Alongside people like Deborah, you’re helping people to thrive, one seed at a time.

KKM reached out to Sivamalar, and equipped her with what she needed. Now she's growing pumpkins and other vegetables. Her family has enough to eat, and Sivamalar is selling surplus produce, generating an income that will sustain her family.

At Harvest time, we are encouraged to reflect on God’s many blessings – a well-stocked fridge, meals with family and friends. Harvest is also a time to thank God for His abundance and provision in our lives. This year, you can help share this abundance with people affected by leprosy who so urgently need it.
